Among author Phyllis Tickle's books were two – *The Great Emergence* and *Emergence Christianity* – that explored what Tickle believed was a re-emergence of Christianity occurring every 500 years. She specifically identifies the Fall of the Roman Empire in 476, the Great Schism of the 11th century – splitting Christianity into the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches, the Great Protestant Reformation of the 16th century, and the Great Transformation of the Industrial Revolution of the 18th and early 19th centuries. Within each of these world-changing eras, Tickle posits that Christianity changed with the world around it, and she believed that another such sea change was underway.

Tickle died in 2015, and wasn't with us here on earth to see a pandemic that threw global business and employment, health, education, travel – you name it – into upheaval. Churches were certainly not excluded from that upheaval, as many faith communities were closed for at least a few weeks, and the ways that Christians gathered for worship, for fellowship and for formation were changed.

Yet even as Christian faith communities shifted with sickness and uncertainty, those same faith communities also became a place of stability: Christians who missed and longed for faith traditions and community longed to return to familiar words and rhythms of worship. What was abundantly clear was that the "old" way of doing things was already giving way to new engagement, even as online worship began taking off when we were unable to gather safely together.

So if, as Tickle has suggested, we were already in the midst of a Great Emergence, we are emerging even more so now, as Christians continue to ask of ourselves, our church communities, our denominations and our faith what it means to be Christian in the world today, and, as author Brian McLaren has frankly put it, "do I stay Christian?"

What seems to be happening is that our faith communities are emerging with a new sense of purpose, and a new sense of intentionality in discerning God's will for us in the world in which we live today.

Like other faith communities, St. George's is emerging, too – called to discern what it means to be a community of faith in Germantown, Tennessee today. As our Vestry revisited our mission statement, one message became abundantly clear: We are called to be a place that welcomes all who are hungry for God and seeking to grow in faith, and a place that extends love to all of God's people. Our new mission statement makes clear that all who wish to be surrounded by the love of God are welcome here:

We gather as one humanity at God's Table. We share a journey of discovery as a welcoming community of everdeepening faith. We rejoice in serving one another and our neighbors through the love and grace of God in Christ. Wherever you are on your spiritual journey, you are part of the tapestry that makes us one.

All are welcome – for worship, for serving in any of our ministries, for gathering in fellowship, for sharing fully in and with our parish family.

And, we are seeking new ways to engage all of God's people in the work of ministry to which we are all called.

- Sunday worship is being livestreamed; while nothing can really replace gathering in community for worship, we are aware that some in our parish family (and beyond!) are unable to be physically present with us, and we do want everyone to be included in our Sunday worship.
- Our new Food & Formation series combines formation, food and fellowship to help us all grow in our faith. We'll discuss many topics of interest in our world and the ways God calls us to respond.
- We have opportunities to serve our parish family in times of joy and in times of sadness by making keeping-in-touch calls, delivering altar flowers, sharing the Eucharist, preparing meals, or running occasional errands for the homebound.
- We have opportunities to serve our neighbors as a parish family and as individuals from providing holy hospitality through Room in the Inn, to serving meals and more with More than a Meal, to inspiring young readers through Team Read, to sharing food with Collierville Food Pantry or our gently-used items with Calvary Church's and Constance Abbey's clothing closets.
- Our many and varied music offerings give us all ways to engage in God's gift of music, through music-making (in our choirs, Sanctifica or Exultemus) or through the enjoyment of amazing concerts.

This photolog shows some of the many ways that we are continuing to discern God's will for us to emerge as a beacon of love and service in our community. 

"Art by Caroline" was an idea for an Instagram handle before it was an idea for my "Senior Independent Study Project" at St. George's Independent School. I have been creating art for as long as I can remember, but only recently discovered that I wanted to make a career out of it. Creating a name for myself and a place to sell my work was the initial idea for this endeavor. I soon realized that I needed to set a monetary goal for my art sales. I knew that I wanted to use the money to help my community, but how? Why not donate an art cart full of supplies to help children have the materials needed to create whatever their hearts' desired? I began to plan everything I would need to make this happen. With my goal of \$500.00, I started to advertise and promote the St. George's Art Show which gave me the exposure I needed to sell my work. 


